While I was visiting my mother in Kansas this summer there was a great tragedy when a five-year-old boy was found unconscious in a farm pond near Wichita. The tragedy was compounded by the disturbing headline which appeared prominently on the front page of *The Wichita Eagle* the day before his death, as he lay hospitalized in a coma: "Boy's Family Requests Prayers to Kapaun."

Rev. Emil Kapaun (CAPE-un) was a Kansas native who served as a Roman Catholic U.S. Army chaplain during the Korean War. He was also a genuine hero, credited with saving hundreds of soldiers' lives in a North Korean prison camp, before he died of pneumonia, while still imprisoned, in 1951. Risking his own life, he would sneak out after dark to scrounge food for those too weak to eat, fashioned makeshift containers to collect water, washed their soiled clothes, and lovingly looked after the sick, though he was wounded and sick himself.

For his heroism on the battlefield Rev. Kapaun had already been awarded the Bronze Star prior to his capture, and he was posthumously awarded the Distinguished Service Cross, and was recently nominated by the Army for a posthumous Medal of Honor. However, although Rev. Kapaun was certainly both an American hero and a hero of the faith, there is no Scriptural justification that prayers should be directed toward him or any other human, living or departed.

The Scriptures are unmistakably clear that only those prayers are heard by God which are offered to and through His Son, Jesus Christ. Consider these clear passages of Scripture:



This disturbing headline is from the front page of the *The Wichita Eagle* of July 29, 2010. The late Rev. Emil Kapaun was an heroic U.S. Army chaplain who died in a POW camp during the Korean War. Those seeking for Kapaun to be declared a saint by the Vatican, and needing miracles to be credited to him, convinced the family of a five-year-old boy who was in a coma after being found in a farm pond to ask that prayers for the boy's healing be made to Kapaun. Tragically, the boy died the next day.

John 14:6 — "I am the way and the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through in Me."

John 14:14 — "You may ask Me for anything in My name, and I will do it."

John 16:23 — "I tell you the truth, My Father will give you whatever you ask in My name."

Acts 4:12 — "For there is no other name under heaven given to men by which we must be saved."

Hebrews 7:25 — "He is able to save completely those who come to God through Him, because He always lives to intercede for them."

1 Timothy 2:5 — "For there is one God and one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus."

1 John 2:1 — "We have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ, the Righteous One."

Having read about the heroism and Christ-like humility of Rev. Kapaun, I have no doubt that if he knew prayers were being addressed to him instead of to Christ, he would have the same appalled reaction as the heavenly angel to whom the Apostle John fell down in worship: "At this I fell at his feet to worship him. But he said to me, 'Do not do it! I am a fellow servant with you and with your brothers who hold to the testimony of Jesus. Worship God!'" (Revelation 19:10).

However, Rev. Kapaun, at rest now with Christ, does not even hear the prayers improperly addressed to him. For, all prayers addressed to any person or god other than Jesus Christ are like calls dialed on a telephone that isn't plugged in. Such prayers don't really go anywhere, they don't connect, because Jesus Christ is the only way to the Father.

Praying to and through persons other than Christ was one of the errors that arose in Christendom during the "Dark Ages," when many Biblical truths were forgotten because even many ministers were ignorant of the Scriptures. Already at the time of the Reformation, Martin Luther and his fellow reformers pointed out the fallacy and falsehood of offering prayers other than to and through Christ, in Article XXI of the Augsburg Confession:

"It is also taught among us that saints should be kept in remembrance so that our faith may be strengthened when we see what grace they received and how they were sustained by faith. Moreover, their good works are to be an example for us . . .

"However, it cannot be proved from the Scriptures that we are to invoke saints or seek help from them. 'For there is one mediator between God and men, the man Christ Jesus' (1 Timothy 2:5), who is the only Savior, the only High Priest, Advocate, and Intercessor before God (Romans 8:34). He alone has promised to hear our prayers. Moreover, according to the Scriptures, the highest form of divine worship is sincerely to seek and call upon this same Jesus Christ in every time of need. 'If anyone

sins, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ, the Righteous One' (1 John 2:1)."

The Apology [Defense] of the Augsburg Confession further states:

"Scripture does not teach us to invoke the saints or to ask their help. Neither a command nor a promise nor an example can be shown from Scripture for the invocation of the saints. . . How do we know, without proof from Scripture, that the saints hear the individual's prayers? Evidently some attribute divinity to the saints . . . This is completely intolerable, for it transfers to the saints honor belonging to Christ alone. It makes them mediators and propitiators. . . To put it mildly, this obscures the work of Christ and transfers to the saints the trust we should have in Christ's mercy. . . they would have us trust more in the mercy of the saints than in the mercy of Christ, though Christ commanded us to come to Him, and not to the saints" (Article XXI).

All prayers addressed to any person or god other than Jesus Christ are like calls dialed on a telephone that isn't plugged in.

Nearly 500 years later, this remains a contemporary, important difference between Lutherans and the Roman Catholic Church. The modern-day Catechism of the Catholic Church recently reasserted: "We can and should ask . . . especially those whom the Church recognizes as saints . . . to intercede for us" (§ 2683).

According to numerous New Testament passages such as Philippians 4:21-22, Romans 1:7, 1 Corinthians 1:2, Ephesians 1:1, and Colossians 1:2, the obvious Biblical meaning of the word "saint" is all believers in Christ: "Greet all the saints in Christ Jesus. . . All the saints send you greetings" (Philippians 4:21-22).

However, in opposition to this Biblical definition of sainthood, "official sainthood" in the Roman Catholic Church

is a special status granted by the Pope only to select individuals if—after their death—at least two miracles can be declared by Vatican officials to have resulted from praying to them. For example, Roman Catholics are now urged to pray to Mother Teresa, who has been credited by the Vatican with one miracle, and needs another to achieve official sainthood.

Likewise, the Vatican is now considering whether prayers to Rev. Kapaun were responsible for the 2008 recovery of a Kansas college student injured in a pole-vaulting accident, and proponents of his "sainthood" were hoping this case with the five-year-old boy would be his second miracle. In this and many other ways, the Roman Catholic Church actively encourages prayer other than to and through Christ alone, contrary to the clear Scriptural injunctions that Christ is our only Mediator.

The Smalcald Articles of the Lutheran Church conclude:

"The invocation of saints . . . destroys the knowledge of Christ. It is neither commanded nor recommended, nor does it have any precedent in the Scriptures. . . This is idolatry. Such honor belongs to God alone" (Article II).

Members of the Board have met several times since I took over as the Chairperson of this Board in July to compile and prioritize a comprehensive list of things that need to be completed, repaired, replaced, fixed, etc. There are many things that need attention both inside and out. We will be asking for help at times from members of the congregation with different projects. Every one of us is busy but this is "our" church and we all need to take ownership and pride in the grounds and property.

Some of the more major issues that we will be addressing are mold and water seepage in the Fellowship Hall, moisture intrusion in the new Sanctuary and several other areas in the new addition, landscaping and seeding around the new

Blessed Are

Revelation's Seven Beautiful Beatitudes

The word "beatitude" means a blessing that is pronounced, and the state of blessedness which results. When we hear the word "beatitude" we think first of the famous beatitudes which Jesus proclaimed in the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5:1-11). However, there is another set of beatitudes in the Bible, "Revelation's Seven Beautiful Beatitudes," which we have been meditating on for our sermon series during August, and will conclude in September.

August 1 — Revelation's First Beautiful Beatitude

Revelation 1:3 — "Blessed is the one who reads the words of this prophecy, and blessed are those who hear it and take to heart what is written in it, because the time is near."

August 8 — Revelation's Second Beautiful Beatitude

Revelation 14:13 — "Then I heard a voice from heaven say, 'Write: Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord.'"

August 15 — Revelation's Third Beautiful Beatitude

Revelation 16:15 — "Behold, I come like a thief! Blessed is he who stays awake and keeps his clothes with him, so that he may not go naked and be shamefully exposed."

August 22 — Revelation's Fourth Beautiful Beatitude

Revelation 19:9 — "Then the angel said to me, 'Write: Blessed are those who are invited to the wedding supper of the Lamb!'"

August 29 — Revelation's Fifth Beautiful Beatitude

Revelation 20:6 — "Blessed and holy are those who have part in the first resurrection. The second death has no power over them."

September 12 — Revelation's Sixth Beautiful Beatitude

Revelation 22:7 — "Behold, I am coming soon! Blessed is he who keeps the words of the prophecy in this book."

September 19 — Revelation's Seventh Beautiful Beatitude

Revelation 22:14 — "Blessed are those who wash their robes, that they may have the right to the tree of life and may go through the gates into the city."

parking area, investigating a possible sink hole and damaged storm sewer pipe in the parking area near the electrical box, preparing the mezzanine for the pipe organ, getting bids to finish the hearth room, installation of a sound system, resolving standing water and poor drainage on the north side of the property, and we will continue to work on resolving issues with the heating and air conditioning units.

In July, the platform on the north end of the Fellowship Hall was removed which had served as the altar area during the years this room was our Sanctuary. This revealed water seepage along the north wall. Tests revealed high concentration of mold spores in areas of the Fellowship Hall. The entire original building was closed for several weeks. We built a wall and sealed off the area where the concentration of mold spores was thought to be highest. We had further testing done on the preschool rooms and while those results were considerably better we then proceeded to thoroughly clean that area before starting preschool this fall. We had the heating and air conditioning units including the ductwork and carpets professionally cleaned and wiped down all surfaces in the preschool rooms, kitchen, restrooms, library, entrance and hallways in the original building to remove any mold spores that may have settled on the surfaces. Preschool and after school care are currently in session but are unable to use the Parish Hall for large motor activities so they may occasionally be using the Gathering Room until the Parish Hall becomes usable again. The mold in the Fellowship Hall will be professionally remediated once the source of water seepage is identified and stopped. It was already planned to replace the carpeting throughout the original building which will now be incorporated in to this project.

Many people have had water problems this year due to the unusually heavy rains, and contractors that deal with such projects are very busy and it is uncertain when the Fellowship Hall will be useable again.

Thank you to the many persons who helped this summer to build the wall, clean, move furniture,

and make necessary repairs. Thank you also to those who have agreed to serve on the Board of Church Properties to oversee these projects as well as keeping up with the general maintenance of the building and property. Please be patient as we address the necessary maintenance and repairs.

If you have any questions about the projects that the Board of Church Properties, in cooperation with the Church Officers and other Board Chairpersons, are working on don't hesitate to ask myself or another Board Chair or Church Officer.

Adriane Dorr New Lutheran Witness Editor

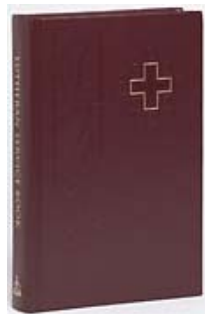
Congratulations to former Holy Cross member Adriane Dorr, daughter of Jon and Gail Dorr, for her recent appointment to the position of Managing
